My daughter, Caity, has recently become interested in our family history. And so I've been thinking about that too. How much of what I've been told about my ancestry is actually the way things happened? How much is, for lack of a better phrase, historical fiction? What has happened in your family that should be told to your children and grandchildren? What are the stories that have shaped you and your family?

Indeed, why are you a Vikings fan in the first place? (That is, if you are.) Simply because you live in Minnesota?

Unfortunately, these old historical roots don't mean that much for too many people today. "Yeah, my ancestors were Norwegian, but I'm just an American. I'm not German or English or French; I'm from Minnesota!" But your family tree was rooted somewhere else, once upon a time. Now, my concern is that when we lose sight of our past, we might also lose our roots. There are definitely too many "unrooted" people wandering around these days. Oh yeah, they'll all groan a bit at first. But, they also just might remember. Maybe your story might sound something like this...

"I remember when I went to my first Vikings game. It was in the old outdoor stadium in Bloomington. The old frozen tundra. It was so cold that day the beer froze in our cups..."

Okay, maybe it's not as exciting as the Vikings' first attack on London. But that's quite okay. Because it's your own Viking story, and it is your story to tell.
